### RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

Broadcasting. The National Center for Audio Experimentation at the University of Wisconsin publishes a newsletter reporting on its various activities involving new research projects for public broadcasting.

Compressed Speech. The Center for Rate Controlled Recordings (compressed speech) at the University of Louisville, Louisville, Ky., 40208, publishes a newsletter which contains information on more than 40 research projects.

## OTHER ACTIVITIES

American Music. Two other American music centers have been "discovered," (the one announced in the last JOURNAL was located at Brooklyn College). One is at the Conservatory of Music, University of Missouri, Kansas City; and the other at Dominican College in San Rafael, California. Both centers indicate they are collecting recordings.

Jazz. Jazz has been added to the Division of the Performing Arts at the Smithsonian Institution. Staffer Martin Williams states, "I hope the Smithsonian will build for itself a major archive of jazz materials--books, periodicals, recordings . . . I invite collectors, discographers and other researchers

who have done their important work alone over the years to lend the Smithsonian their collections . . . that the Institution can give their efforts support and perhaps a permanent home."

New Record Cleaner. Reviewed in <u>High Fidelity</u>, "New Products," December, 1971, and an addenda regarding that review, March, 1972, a new record cleaner is available which, the review indicates, leaves less residue on the recording than tap water. The cleaner is made by Discwasher, Inc., Columbia, Mo.

Record Promotion. A new record promotion scheme has been devised by Jim Holt, Hollywood Audition Service-"Dial-a-disc." A DJ can dial the audition service for plays of new material eliminating multiple copies and time coming from wholesalers, promotors, and manufacturers and music publishers. If it catches on, it will also eliminate some radio station archives of pop music, sometimes the only source of pop recordings, for research of outdated material.

Reccoce Records. On the death of Mr. Court, the company--Ross, Court & Co.--was dissolved. However, Dr. Andre Ross, now at the Handleman Archives, Miami University, Coral Gables, Fla., has announced intentions to continue Roccoco Records.
