THE RECORDED SPEECHES AND OTHER UTTERANCES

OF FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, 1920 - 1945

The Franklin D. Roosevelt Library at Hyde Park, New York, established by a joint resolution of Congress on June 18, 1939, was built according to plans first proposed by the President to house his papers, books, museum objects, and other historical material, such as films, recordings, and still photographs. The original building was erected with private contributions and was opened to the general public in 1941. As such it was the first Presidential library so funded and established and is today the third busiest research institution in the field of American history in the country, surpassed only by the National Archives (of which it is a part) and the Library of Congress.

Included among the first materials to be accessioned by the new institution were sound recordings, motion pictures, and still photographs. Because of the fragile nature of the first two categories, they were -- and the originals still are--stored in the vaults of the National Archives. As early as 1949, however, the Archives made and sent to Hyde Park 16-inch transcription discs of the President's speeches and other recordings that had been deposited there by the White House during the President's 12-year tenure. Until comparatively recently these discs were the only means by which the President's voice could be heard in many of his famous speeches and addresses. Newsreel film, of course, contained excerpts from his speeches, commonly edited to news clips of perhaps thirty seconds to one minute in length and connected for the newsreel audience by a commentator's words. The entire speeches, however, existed only in the transcriptions owned by the Roosevelt Library and air checks that were then owned by the various radio broadcasting networks or their affiliates. Gradually, as space for storage became more precious. many of these original air checks disappeared from the network vaults and gravitated to private collectors of

radio program material -- their whereabouts unknown to all but this small group.

Fortunately for posterity two radio networks made some provision to prevent this scattering: the Columbia Broadcasting Company organized its collection from 1939 onward, and the National Broadcasting Company kept its collection more or less intact in its Radio City headquarters. Neither of these collections is complete, but thanks to these two organizations this library has been able to obtain dubbings of those relatively few recordings missing from its collections so that today the Roosevelt Library has what is perhaps the most complete collection of the President's recorded utterances presently available. It cannot be said that the library's collection is complete, as it does not include recordings which must exist somewhere of some major speeches, such as many campaign speeches and some of the early "Fireside Chats"; but it may be said that the collection is still growing. The most recent accretion, for instance, consisted of approximately twenty Roosevelt speeches that had somehow escaped being sent to the White House during his Presidency. These were found in the NBC recordings library and tape dubs of them were generously deposited in Hyde Park on permanent loan by the company.

In addition to the President's speeches and talks, the library also holds in his personal collection, recordings of political speeches and radio appearances of administration spokesmen; programs of music performed by Federal Music Project orchestras, bands, vocal ensembles, and artists; radio dramatizations produced by federal agencies; political and nonpolitical radio addresses by associates and members of the President's family, including his mother and his wife; and poetry and dramatic readings sent to the President by government agencies and professional artists.

The library also has another nearly complete collection of the President's speeches donated by the International Business Machines Corporation; a collection of 363 items from Mrs. Roosevelt's radio and television appearances, which usually posed her as hostess to writers, politicians, and other figures foremost in international and American thought; and its own

collection, numbering 764 items, consisting of disc and tape recordings found among the papers of manuscript donors, sent to or purchased by the library, and produced by and for the library. This latter collection includes additional speeches by the President donated by commercial and private sources; recorded interviews pertaining to the President and Mrs. Roosevelt from commercial and private sources; recordings of memorial exercises in honor of the President and Mrs. Roosevelt; and additional recorded material pertaining to the President and Mrs. Roosevelt from all major network sources.

Needless to say, the sound quality of these recordings varies from very good to poor, extending as they do over a span of years from 1920 to 1960. The President's speeches, sometimes delivered outdoors under adverse conditions, are particularly susceptible to varying quality. Occasionally the Archives' masters were not as good as they should have been; the same speech may vary in quality from master to master depending on the location of the microphone from which the original recording was taken. Much can be done today with modern equalization equipment, and the Roosevelt Library is attempting to improve the quality of the tape dubbings which it produces from the discs in its possession.

What follows is a detailed description of the library's collection of the President's speeches and utterances. It is hoped that readers who have in their possession recordings of speeches not included on this list, whether it be on disc or tape, will communicate with the Roosevelt Library with a view to making additions to the collection.

The Presidential recordings

The following recordings of the President's voice exist for the most part in two or more disc-recorded versions in the collections of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Library, Hyde Park, New York. The original 238 recorded items were presented to the President, usually by the radio networks, and were sent by the White House to the National Archives for eventual deposit in this Library. The Archives retained these original recordings as masters and prepared duplicate disc recordings of them for

the library. The masters are still retained in Washington and are presently being transferred to tape for deposit here.

This original series is duplicated, with some additions, by the collection of discs made at the direction of Thomas J. Watson, Sr., first president of International Business Machines Corporation, which donated the collection to the library in 1965.

To the original list the library was able to add several recordings made by radio station WKIP, Pough-keepsie, as well as a series of twenty speeches from the recordings library of the National Broadcasting Company. Through the courtesy of W.H. Utterback, Jr. of Amarillo, Texas, we have been able to further expand the collection of the President's recorded speeches by his continuing gift of tape recordings made from his collection or air checks and other disc-recorded masters. These latter recordings, for the most part, include not only the President's speeches, but also the radio network commentators' narrative material.

The present collection now amounts to 303 individual speeches or utterances. To this number must be added a series of unique recordings made in the President's office during the period from August 23 to November 8. 1940. These consist of Presidential press conferences. numbered 674 through 694 (fourteen in all), as well as conversations with visitors to the President's office, the office staff, and members of the official family. These sixteen discs are dubbings made by the National Archives about 1948 of the original acetate recordings produced by an experimental machine made by the General Electric Company. The original recordings were destroyed because of deterioration as soon as these sole copies were made. The sound quality is uniformly poor, but the best of them can, with modern equalization equipment, be made usable. Those in this series noted in the listing to be of poor quality are below acceptable standards for reproduction.

Recordings of the President's voice are in the public domain and require no permission for duplication or replay. Network or newsreel commentary, however, is the literary property of the originating agency, and

permission of the radio network or newsreel company must be obtained prior to commercial use.

In the following calendar all speeches originated in Washington unless otherwise noted. The source of all recordings, except as noted, is this library. Those speeches for which tapes do not exist as yet have not been given call numbers. Where more than one tape of a speech is available, the best choice is indicated with an asterisk. The Utterback tapes (symbol WHU) are uniformly of the best quality obtainable from discs.
